INTERPRETIVE TRAIL HIKE AT RANCOCAS

CONNECT WITH NATURE SERIES

Females of the species migrate to a vernal pool or wetland to deposit their eggs, and the fascinating cycle of the next generation begins to unfold. The afternoon’s activity will include a hike to search for the three species of salamanders that make Rancocas their home. Waterproof footwear is suggested.
